

An internet citation is made of a few basic components.

**These components are:**

1. Author.
2. "Title of Document, Page or Site" in quotes.
3. Title of the Magazine, Newspaper, Book, etc underlined.
4. Editor
5. Indication of the type of material (ex: interview, map, forum posting)
6. Date of the article, page or site creation or last modification date.
7. Group responsible for page or site.
8. The date on which you accessed the page or site placed directly before the URL.
9. The full URL (uniform resource locator) in angle brackets. (ex:

If you are having difficulty finding the necessary information to build a complete bibliography, a basic format of Title, Access Date and URL is sometimes acceptable. Ask your teacher/professor/editor for their preferences.

**Regarding the URL:**

- The URL must be typed out IN FULL in angle brackets. (Note: If your word processing software has an autoformat function and is turning it into a hyperlinks simply turn it off for this portion.)
- If the URL is so long that you are required to divide the line, please make sure that your division point does not affect the locating of the document. The purpose of indicating the URL is for your readers to be able to find and view the document that you are citing.

**TWO AUTHORS OF AN INTERNET DOCUMENT:**

Doe, Jane, and John Q. Public. Downloaded Document Title. Lehigh Cement Company:  
Education, 2000. 01 Dec. 2005 <<http://www.lehighcement.com/pdfs/pagename.pdf>>.

**NO AUTHOR OF AN INTERNET DOCUMENT:**

"This is the Document Title." Lehigh Cement Company: Education. 01 January 2000. 01  
December 2005 <<http://www.lehighcement.com/education/pagename.html>>.
